





The course uses new technology to teach students about what it's like to work on a mine site, including the use of Oculus Virtual Reality Headsets so they can experience mining conditions up close. In 2020, 18 schools from the greater Hunter region participated in the program. Although COVID-19 interrupted the delivery of the program, lessons were uploaded to an online system so participating schools could continue to teach students.

This is a great program designed to support our future mining workforce and it's hoped that between 10 and 15 new schools will join the program in 2021.

AUSTRALIA'S WORLD-CLASS THERMAL COAL - INCLUDING THAT PRODUCED IN THE **HUNTER - IS IN GREAT** DEMAND ACROSS THE REGION FOR ITS HIGH QUALITY.

With ongoing interest within Australia, our region and the world about the future of coal, it's important to get an accurate picture of demand, especially from our customers in the Asia-Pacific.

The MCA was pleased to release recently analysis from expert forecasters Commodity Insights which projected that Asian thermal coal imports will grow by over 270Mt to more than a billion tonnes per annum over the next decade.

THIS SUGGESTS THAT THE HUNTER **REGION'S WORLD-LEADING** THERMAL COAL PRODUCERS CAN BENEFIT FROM STRONG FUTURE **DEMAND GROWTH, ESPECIALLY IN** THE ASIA-PACIFIC REGION.

Australian thermal coal is amongst the highest quality in the world, enabling more energy to be produced with less CO2 emitted per kWh of electricity produced than most alternative sources.

Commodity Insights found that global seaborne thermal coal volumes doubled between 2006 and 2019, from 500Mt (million tonnes) to 1,000Mt, growing in volume every year of that period except 2015. Average growth over that 13year period was almost 40Mt per annum, or around eight times the average annual output of an Australian thermal coal mine.

The report updates 2018 analysis of seaborne thermal coal demand in the Asia Pacific region to 2030 and projects that Asian thermal coal imports are expected to grow by more than 270 Mt to 1.1 billion tonnes per annum.

TO GIVE COALFACE READERS **SOME CONTEXT, 270MT IS MORE THAN AUSTRALIA'S ENTIRE 2019** THERMAL COAL EXPORTS (212MT).

This demand growth is being driven by high electricity demand and population growth; coal-fired generation capacity that's been commissioned in many countries, and in some regions, an inability of domestic coal production to keep pace with demand growth.

Developing Asian countries, especially Thailand, Vietnam. Indonesia, the Philippines, Pakistan and Bangladesh all have low levels of per capita electricity consumption.

Even China only has a power consumption level which is half of Japan's and a third of the USA's.

India's per capita consumption level is only one-tenth of Japan's, and Bangladesh's is less than onetwentieth of Japan's.

These relatively low consumption levels indicate there is significant future electricity demand growth across Asia, and for all Asian nations to reach a Japanese level of consumption, massive investment in power generation capacity will be required.

Of course, over the long term, government policy in relation to both energy sources and emissions reduction are important drivers of coal's share of power generation and therefore import demand.

That means these forecasts will continue to be subject to changes in government policy, including emissions reduction measures to meet Paris Agreement targets.

The challenge for all governments is to work harder to reduce emissions, including through the use of technology such as carbon capture,

utilisation and storage (CCUS). IT'S CRITICALLY IMPORTANT TO ACHIEVE GLOBAL NET ZERO **EMISSIONS, AND THERE ARE CLEARLY CHALLENGES AHEAD** IN THE ASIA-PACIFIC REGION IN RELATION TO EMISSIONS REDUCTION, REQUIRING **CONSIDERATION OF LOW-EMISSIONS TECHNOLOGIES** SUCH AS CCUS, RENEWABLES, GAS AND NUCLEAR POWER.

Australia's minerals industry has commenced implementation of the MCA Climate Action Plan, focused on driving lowemissions technology within operations and across mine sites, transparency and reporting and knowledge sharing.

As the world recovers from COVID-19 and works towards a zero net emissions future, Australian minerals companies will play a central role in providing the resources needed to grow sustainably in coming decades.

It's the first time in 3,000 years that the endangered species has been released onto the mainland.

GREEN LIGHT FOR MALABAR COAL

Malabar Resources has welcomed the release of the NSW Government's Assessment Report for the Maxwell Underground Project and its recommendation that the project is in the public's interest.

The Maxwell Project is an underground coal mining development planned for Jerrys Plains on the former Drayton mine site - the project is strongly opposed by neighbouring thoroughbred studs Coolmore and Godolphin.

The aim of the project is to extract 148 million tonnes of coal over 26 years, generating 250 jobs during construction and 350 afterwards while injecting \$509 million into the economy.

The Government's report will now be considered by the Independent Planning Commission who will hold a public hearing in due course.

The project was put on public exhibition last year and saw the Government receive 231 submissions, 77 per cent of which expressed support for the project going ahead.

THE PROOF IS IN THE PUDDING

Where There's A Will was named winner of the NSW Mental Health Matters Community Initiative Award that recognises an organisation working towards improving the mental health of marginalised communities and facilitating access to information and services.

In essence, the award recognises that Where There's A Will is a charity that has been built by the community for the community and in the judges words "exemplify the grass roots action of communities and the way that when communities come together they can achieve something that benefits everybody".

BIG THINGS HAPPENING AT MOUNT PLEASANT

The Modification 4 of the Mach Energy Mount Pleasant Operation at Muswellbrook will be getting underway in the next month or so.

The modification was approved in 2018 for the Rail 2 Project to construct the approved rail spur, loop, conveyor and rail load-out facility and associated services; relocate the Hunter River water supply pump station, water pipeline and associated electricity supply that follows the current

rail spur alignment; and the demolition and removal of redundant, temporary infrastructure once the new infrastructure has been commissioned and is fully operational.

The work on the new rail loop adjacent to Overton and Wybong Roads will start before the year is out.

Mount Pleasant has commenced a community engagement program which will seek to identify any concerns and keep locals in the loop with construction works.

AGL IS GETTING READY FOR SUMMER

Energy giant AGL has begun a \$35 million maintenance works program at the Liddell Power Station at Muswellbrook, which they say will provide jobs and help support the recovery of the region's local economy.

AGL is continuing its closure and transition plans for Liddell, and this will be the last major outage at the site before it is retired in

Work on Unit 2 at the site will be finished in early December, and throughout the outage, around 400 contractors will be employed. AGL Chief Operating Officer Markus Brokhof says with the summer months fast approaching, the works are critical to ensure customers have a reliable power supply.

EDDERTON ROAD DONE AND DUSTED.

Edderton Road is now officially open after months of roadworks and construction.

Mining giant BHP started the **Edderton Road Realignment** Project in April 2019 which involved relocating a 4.4-kilometre section of the road including the intersection of Denman and Edderton Road.

Mount Arthur provided funds for the entirety of the project and will be responsible for maintaining the road for the next 30 years.

Mine General Manager Adam Lancey said the "project is critical to the continuation of the Mt Arthur Coal mine as it progressively moves to the west, away from the township of Muswellbrook".

WATER SECURITY FOR THE UPPER HUNTER

The Upper Hunter will have more water security once work starts, and finishes on the Upper Hunter Water Security Project Pipeline.

Muswellbrook Shire Council has received \$18.9 million for the pipeline from the NSW Government for the construction of the 11km pipeline that will supply water from Denman to Hollydeen and Sandy Hollow.

Upper Hunter MP Michael Johnsen said the pipeline will allow local businesses to expand their operations, open the door to new agribusiness investment opportunities such as the Yarraman Abattoir and Feedlot that could be on the cards, and create hundreds of local jobs.

CHRISTMAS CAME EARLY, HOPEFULLY CONSTRUCTION WILL

Much to the delight of the Upper Hunter the transport and infrastructure spend in the Federal budget included millions for the Singleton Bypass.

It's a project that's been on the cards for years with the NSW Government having already poured in \$96 million for the project that was just awaiting Federal funding.

Now \$560 million has been announced by the Morrison Government for the estimated \$700 million project.

Construction though still isn't due to start until 2023.

The funding now poured into the project doesn't add up to the estimated total cost, but the NSW Government said it shouldn't cost the total \$700 million.




MAYFIELD GROUP

CASH FOR COMMUNITY

ALMOST \$4 MILLION IN FUNDING WILL BENEFIT THE COMMUNITY UNDER THREE SEPARATE PROPOSED VOLUNTARY PLANNING AGREEMENTS (VPAS) **BETWEEN SINGLETON COUNCIL AND** LOCAL MINING OPERATIONS.

The United Wambo Project Planning Agreement proposal will see Jerry Plains receive a significant boost with \$755,000 for the Jerrys Plains Village Centre, recreation grounds and main street upgrade as well as \$570,000 for local projects in Warkworth and Jerrys Plains. The remaining \$1.325 million would be invested into Council's Community and Economic Development Fund.



The Mount Owen Mine Amendment to Existing Planning Agreement will see \$924,00 deposited to the fund with an additional \$226,000 in benefits to the local community. The draft Rix's Creek Planning Agreement proposes another \$432,000 deposited into the fund.

MAYOR OF SINGLETON, CR SUE MOORE SAID THE FUND WAS **ESTABLISHED LAST YEAR IN A NEW** APPROACH TO THE WAY COUNCIL USES VPAS TO WORK WITH MINING **COMPANIES TO ADDRESS CHALLENGES** AND HELP BUILD DIVERSITY IN THE LOCAL ECONOMY.

"The three draft Agreements include immediate injections for the local community, particularly much longedfor improvements to Jerrys Plains that I'm very excited to see come to fruition."

"But through the fund, the draft agreements also provide a sensible and sustainable injection for the

future with money in the bank to be spent on programs, infrastructure and projects needed to support positive growth.'

Kell and Rob have partnered with Malabar since November 2018, originally introducing 50 steers onto pasture rehabilitation. The trial continued in 2019 and 2020 and was expanded to include heifers being strategically rotated between four paddocks located on the site.

"Grazing cattle on Malabar's rehab over the last two years has been a productive and viable venture," Kell and Rob said.

"Our cattle have thrived on the rehab and produced high yielding results, putting on roughly 1kg per day during their time on site.

"The rehab has also benefited from the grazing and held up well in all conditions – in both dry and wet times – aided by our ability to rotate stock and adjust numbers from pasture to pasture."

In September, the farmers' Angus x Charolais heifers that grazed on the rehabilitation topped the market at the Singleton sale yards selling for

\$1998 a head. A month earlier, the Angus steers that originally came to the mine site in 2018 were sold to a local abattoir and met all primary marketing criteria.

MALABAR CHAIRMAN WAYNE SEABROOK
SAID: "IT HAS BEEN A JOY TO PARTNER WITH
LOCAL FARMERS, KELL AND ROB, ON A PROJECT
THAT HAS PROVIDED IMPORTANT ECOLOGICAL

"As we continue to restore the former open-cut mine – now known as Maxwell Infrastructure – to pastures and native woodland, we look forward to more conversations with local farmers about how we make the land productive and sustainable for future generations."

Open cut mining operations were undertaken at the site between 1982 and 2016. Since Malabar took

over the site, it has progressively rehabilitated the land, with the primary objective being a landform that is compatible with surrounding land use practices such as cattle grazing.



LEARN FROM THE LAWMAN

STUART BARNETT IS OUR MINING INDUSTRY'S LEADING PERSONAL INIURY LAWYER. THIS MONTH HE HAS SOME IMPORTANT ADVICE ABOUT THE INTRODUCTION OF AN INTEGRATED BIRTH CERTIFICATE FOR ADOPTED PEOPLE.

When an adoption order was made, the practice in New South Wales was for the Registrar of Births, Deaths and Marriages (BDM) to issue a birth certificate which contained only the child's adoptive parents' details. This was called a Post-Adoptive Birth Certificate. It made no reference to child's parents at birth.


NEW LEGISLATION HAS BEEN INTRODUCED AND WILL TAKE **EFFECT FROM THE 16 NOVEMBER** 2020 AND IS KNOWN AS THE **ADOPTION LEGISLATION AMENDMENT (INTEGRATED BIRTH** CERTIFICATES) ACT 2020. THE **EFFECT OF THE AMENDMENT IS** THAT THE REGISTRAR OF BDM WILL, FOLLOWING AN ADOPTION ORDER, **ISSUE BOTH A POST-ADOPTIVE BIRTH CERTIFICATE AND AN** INTEGRATED BIRTH CERTIFICATE.

An Integrated Birth Certificate will contain information about an adopted persons parents and siblings at birth as well as their parents and siblings after adoption.

Both types of certificate will be valid birth certificates. So, the adopted person will have the choice as to which certificate they wish to use when establishing their identity.

From the commencement of the amendment on the 16 November 2020 the issue of both certificates by the Registrar of BDM will be automatic for adopted persons. No special application will be required.

For those persons who were adopted on or after 1 January 2010 and before 16 November 2020 the Registrar will issue an Integrated Birth Certificate on application by the adopted person and where the adopted person is under the age of 18 years the consent of the adoptive parents will be required. Where the adopted person was born before the 1 January 2010 the adopted person will first have to obtain a Adoption Information Certificate from the Department of Communities and Justice before applying to the registrar of BDM for an Integrated Birth Certificate. In those circumstances and if the adopted person is under the age of 18 then the consent of both the adoptive parents and birth parents is required.

THE UPPER HUNTER MINING DIALOGUE HAS RELEASED ITS ANNUAL DATA TRACKING HOW MUCH MINED LAND WAS REHABILITATED IN THE UPPER HUNTER AND HOW MUCH WATER WAS EXTRACTED FROM THE LOCAL HUNTER RIVER SYSTEM BY MINING COMPANIES AND OTHER USERS IN 2019.

The Rehabilitation Principles and Commitments Project data is collated annually by the Dialogue and measures rehabilitation of mined land compared to how much land was disturbed by mining in a given year. The project commenced in 2012 and now includes eight years of rehabilitation data.

The Water Accounting Framework was started in 2014 and now provides six years of data primarily tracking water extraction from the Upper Hunter region of the Hunter River including usage by the mining industry, agriculture, other industries and residential use.

Due to the drought conditions and lack of other sources, water users extracted more water from the Hunter River than in 2018,

however, the additional usage was more than offset by increased "environmental flows" into the river through the release of more water from storage dams.

Key findings of the projects are: **REHABILITATION** PRINCIPLES AND COMMITMENTS:

- A 41 per cent decrease in newly disturbed land during 2019 compared to 2018; the 2019 data shows the lowest amount of newly disturbed land in a calendar year since records started in 2012.
- While the amount of land newly rehabilitated during the year decreased from the 2018 total. the ratio of rehabilitation to disturbance increased to 89 per cent which is the highest on record. Simply put, this means for

every hectare of land disturbed by mining in 2019, 0.89 of a hectare was rehabilitated.

- Total land under rehabilitation at Upper Hunter mining companies rose to 13,470 hectares; an increase of 53 per cent since 2012.
- Land held as biodiversity offsets totals 41,803 hectares or almost twice the amount of disturbed land (22,518 hectares) while land managed by mining companies for agricultural use is 59,209 hectares or more than 2.6 hectares for every hectare of disturbed land.

WATER ACCOUNTING FRAMEWORK • In a drier than average year, 214

billion litres of water entered the river system in the Upper Hunter which was 26 billion litres more than in 2018.

- 33 per cent of that water stayed in the river system, up from 28 per cent in 2018.
- Mining used less than eight per cent of the water in the system which was the same percentage as the previous year, however, the actual usage was up by 4.0 gigalitres from 2018.
- The amount of water extracted and used by agriculture, residents and businesses was 58 per cent; a reduction on the 65 per cent in 2018 but an increase of 3.0 gigalitres in actual water extracted.
- The mining industry reused 55 per cent of its water onsite; up from 46 per cent in 2018.
- No mine water was discharged into the Hunter River in 2019; a repeat of 2018's result.



'GREENS LOSE **HIGH MORAL GROUND'**

FORMER GREENS LEADER DR BOB BROWN RECENTLY BOASTED HE WAS PROUD OF THE ANTI-ADANI CONVOY WHICH TRAVELLED THROUGH CENTRAL QUEENSLAND DURING LAST YEAR'S FEDERAL ELECTION CAMPAIGN. THE CONVOY, HE TOLD THE MEDIA, HAD SECURED THE RE-ELECTION OF QUEENSLAND GREENS SENATOR, LARISSA WATERS.

Of course, we will never know whether that is true. Senators are elected by the whole state and who knows, maybe the convoy tickled the fancy of enough voters in inner-city Brisbane to get her across the electoral line? But we can be pretty sure the convoy had a much different impact in regional Queensland communities like Rockhampton, Gladstone and Townsville.

One thing is certain, the convoy damaged the Labor Party because it highlighted Bill Shorten's illconsidered equivocation over the Adani Mine proposal. That's political death in regional Queensland where support for the coal mining industry is strong and people place a high value on every job opportunity.

Why would Dr Bob Brown run his convoy through regional Queensland where he knew it would be met with a hostile response? The convoy had been through Brisbane and a couple of towns in northern NSW where there is a level of anti-fossil fuels sentiment. These towns were fertile ground for a few extra Green votes. But why press into enemy territory?

THE ANSWER IS SIMPLE. BROWN DOESN'T WANT TO WIN THE

CLIMATE CHANGE WAR. NOR DO THE GREENS COLLECTIVELY. ASK YOURSELF THE QUESTION: WHERE **WOULD THE GREENS BE IF THE DECADES-LONG CARBON CONFLICT CAME TO AN END? WHAT WOULD** THEY CAMPAIGN ON? HOW WOULD THEY FUNDRAISE IF GOVERNMENTS RAMPED-UP THEIR CLIMATE **CHANGE RESPONSES AND THE** ISSUE WAS NEUTRALISED?

Bob Brown and his followers aren't looking for policy solutions, they are looking for votes. It's crystal clear and its nothing new. In 2009 the Greens voted against the Rudd Government's Carbon Pollution Reduction Scheme (CPRS) in the Senate. Rudd had promised an emissions trading scheme during the 2007 election campaign. John Howard had promised one too. But the Greens declared the CPRS

was not good enough and the scheme fell over. It would be naïve to believe the Greens took a principled stand. They had been arguing for a carbon constraint policy for years and the passage of the CPRS through the Parliament would have delivered one. They should have happily voted for it. Like the GST, if the CPRS was in place today no would even know it was there. Carbon emissions would be lower and coal and gas industries would still be

strong. But the Greens would be without their favourite protest tool. So much for policy purity.





THE NSW RESOURCES REGULATOR HAS PUBLISHED A NEW GUIDELINE ON AUTONOMOUS MINING EQUIPMENT ABOUT THE RISKS THAT MUST BE IDENTIFIED AND CONTROLLED IN ADOPTING **AUTONOMOUS MINING EQUIPMENT.**

Mining is a high hazard industry and the risks posed by mechanisation have continued to evolve as larger and more complex machines have been introduced. The introduction of autonomous mining equipment, while reducing risks to some workers, will expose other workers to additional and different risks.

Resources Regulator Chief Inspector of Mines Garvin Burns said, "Since the introduction of mechanisation to NSW coal mines in the mid-20th century, workers have been exposed to the hazards arising from operating or working in close proximity to mining machinery."

"A number of coal mine operators in NSW are trialling autonomous equipment, or are evaluating how it may be applied at their operations. The introduction of this type of equipment may offer productivity gains and reduce risks to some workers, however it will expose other workers to additional and different risks. We have released guidance to assist mine operators to identify and control these risks to protect the safety of workers."

AUTONOMOUS OPERATION, BY DEFINITION. MEANS THERE WILL NOT BE PEOPLE ONBOARD **MACHINES, HOWEVER IT DOES** NOT MEAN THERE WILL BE NO PEOPLE IN THE AUTONOMOUS **OPERATING ZONE (AOZ).**

The introduction of remote controls enabled people to be removed from the risks arising from a machine such as load haul dump vehicles (LHDs) being buried in a stope, or a continuous miner being buried during pillar extraction. But new and different risks emerged. Operators have been crushed by the machine they controlled when they placed themselves too close to the machine.

While automation associated with longwall mining equipment has enabled workers to be removed from

places of high risk, it has created new risks, such as being crushed by an automatically advancing roof support. The introduction of tele-remote

operation eliminated some risks for machine operators, however introduced new risks for maintenance workers who must approach a machine to undertake faultfinding and repairs.

Removing machinery operators from the mining environment has also resulted in a loss of sensory awareness (sight, hearing, touch and smell). This loss of sensory awareness impairs the ability to quickly identify developing problems on a machine and may lead to a more significant incident.

THE REGULATOR HAS A LEGISLATIVE REQUIREMENT FOR OPERATORS TO PROVIDE A REVIEW OF HAZARD MANAGEMENT AND CONTROL PLANS WHEN INTRODUCING **AUTONOMOUS EQUIPMENT. IT** ALSO HAS OUTLINED THE NEED TO CONDUCT RISK ASSESSMENTS THAT IDENTIFY CRITICAL CONTROLS THAT PREVENT THE DANGERS OF **AUTONOMOUS EQUIPMENT.**

This necessitates a thorough and rigorous risk assessment process to be completed to understand the limitations of existing controls, the identification of new controls and the implementation of these controls to ensure that risks are managed to an acceptable level.

Risk assessments for the introduction and operation of autonomous machines must consider all foreseeable scenarios where it is possible for people to interact with the machines, or where the machines may interact with other equipment or infrastructure.

The guideline is applicable to haul trucks, loaders, dozers, grader, water carts, blast hole drill rigs, excavators and load haul dumps/boggers.

A significant factor impacting work health and safety is prolonged sitting and SafeWork Australia has now recognised too much sitting as a workplace health and safety issue. Studies show that long periods of sitting can increase the risk of physical and mental health issues in both the short and long term. Desk-based workers spend on average three quarters of their workday sitting, and the same goes for operators and drivers who spend the main bulk of their working day parked on their rump.

When you sit, your large postural muscles are not working very hard. This means you're expending very little energy and your blood circulation is reduced. The cumulative impacts on the body and mind of too much sitting can have serious health consequences, including increased risk of early death, cardiovascular disease, diabetes, cancer, poor cognitive function, deep vein thrombosis, depression and poor quality of life. We all know that sedentary lifestyles can have many adverse effects on our health so the less sitting or



lying down we do during the day the better our chances for living a healthy life. What you may not know though is that even if you exercise regularly but are still sitting for long periods throughout the day, you are still at risk. The latest research suggests you need 60-75 minutes per day of moderate-intensity activity to combat the dangers of excessive sitting.

HUMANS ARE BUILT TO STAND UPRIGHT. OUR HEARTS AND CARDIOVASCULAR SYSTEMS WORK MORE EFFECTIVELY THAT WAY. MOVING OUR MUSCLES MORE FREQUENTLY ALSO HELPS **OUR DIGESTIVE SYSTEM BE** MORE EFFICIENT AND THUS OUR **BOWELS WILL ALSO FUNCTION** MORE EFFICIENTLY TOO.

Sitting for long periods can also cause problems with our backs, especially if we consistently sit with poor posture or don't use ergonomically designed chairs or workstations. Sitting can also cause our hip flexor muscles to shorten, which can lead to problems with hip joints.

While we don't understand the links

between sitting and mental health as well as we do the links between sitting and physical health, we do know that the risk of both anxiety and depression is higher in people that sit more. This might be because people who spend a lot of time sitting are missing the positive effects of physical activity and fitness. Physical inactivity contributes

to over three million preventable deaths worldwide each year. More than half of Australian adults do less than the recommended 30 minutes of moderate intensity physical activity each day and only one third of Australian children do the recommended 60 minutes of physical activity every day.

SO WHAT CAN YOU DO TO MITIGATE THE RISKS OF PROLONGED SITTING? WHILE YOU CAN'T BEAT THE BENEFITS OF REGULAR EXERCISE, THERE'S ALSO PLENTY OF **SMALL SIMPLE THINGS YOU CAN** DO TO BUILD MORE ACTIVITY INTO YOUR WORKING DAY.

- Take the stairs instead of the lift.
- Walk over and talk to your colleagues instead of emailing them.
- Take a short walk on your lunchbreak.
- Stand at your desk for short periods.
- Walk around when you're on the phone.
- Do some simple body weight exercises such as squats and lunges.
- Each hour do some stand up stretching for a couple of minutes.





With service lives running from as low as 16,000 hours up to circa 38,000 hours, it easy to understand just how critical the engine selection is when selecting a fleet of new mining machines or, which is increasingly the case, repowering existing equipment. Such is the current battle between Cummins and MTU with miners increasingly changing out engines in favour of the competitor with significant cost savings achieved. Perhaps most telling MTU's first-time inclusion in Hitachi's new EX3600-7, a move that must have MTU's HO salivating at the chops.



WHATEVER HAS STEERED YOU TOWARDS THE LOVE OF DIRT BIKES, YOU SOON REALISE THAT IT CAN BECOME QUITE ADDICTIVE.

WHERE TO RIDE

that governs the land.

If you're new to the dirt bike scene, you may be left wondering where to start, and where you can ride. The easiest and safest option is to start by getting your motorbike license and a road registered dirt bike. There are other options, but outside of privately owned dirt bike parks or knowing someone with a property, you can't legally ride anywhere on an unregistered bike. If you've never ridden before – fear not! The motorcycle learning course required to obtain your license is designed for people that have never thrown a leg over a bike and will teach you all the basic fundamentals you need to know. Having a license and registration will see you have access to National Parks, State Forests, some beaches, and various other sections of bushland where public vehicle access is permitted. Most of these locations will generally need some sort of permit to access and can be obtained by contacting the relevant body

We recommend obtaining a National Parks Annual pass from National Parks & Wildlife and always check for track closures and weather warnings before you head off on your ride. In most instances, normal road rules will apply to these locations and you should always obey any signage and stick to formed tracks and roads.

If you're hell-bent on thrashing your favourite motorcrosser or unregistered dirt bike around, then some places you're going to want to check out are MX Central at Barleigh Ranch north of Raymond Terrace, The Island Action Sports Complex at Nerong, Louee Enduro and Motorcross Complex near Kandos or Binacrombi Bike Farm at Taralga. All these facilities are set up for unregistered dirt bikes and you'll need to book in advance to secure a ride.

WHAT TO RIDE

Ok, so it's time to do an honest self-appraisal of what type of riding you intend to do, and your skill level. Just as all riders are not created equally, not all dirt bikes are created equally. The best-looking dirt bike on the showroom, may not

always be the right one for you.

The first thing to consider if you are on your bike 'L's or 'P's is whether the bike is LAMS (Leaner Approved Motorcycle Scheme) approved. To be learner approved the bike must have a power-toweight ratio of no more than 150kw per tonne.

If you're already on your full bike license, then it's open slather but some other things to consider are the style of riding you'll be doing and the terrain you intend on tackling. Hardcore enduro bikes, which are generally light, agile and powerful, are perfect for tackling tight single trail and challenging terrain, but can be unforgiving to the novice, uncomfortable to ride over longer periods of time and sometimes geared a little too short for more open county and dirt roads.

If open dirt roads, fire trails and exploring/touring are more your thing, you may be better off on a dual sports or adventure bike which typically have softer suspension, taller gearing, tyres better suited to a wider range of surfaces and power that while still can be plentiful, is usually a little more subtle than a full-on race-bred bike.

If you're still unsure, a lot of motorcycle dealerships will host ride days, so the best way of getting to know a bike is to jump on one and have a test ride. Whatever you decide to purchase, make sure you factor into your budget the best riding gear you can afford. A good quality helmet, goggles, boots, body armour, pants and gloves are definitely not worth skimping on.

So, if you're not already on the dirt bike band wagon, we think it's about time you tried it. But be warned - it is addictive and once it's in the blood. it will become a life-long passion.

AS WE MOVE INTO THE WARMER MONTHS IT'S HARD TO BEAT OVER THE DEEPER INSHORE REES FOR SIMPPER. THE NEWS' BERKLEY GULP GRUBS DEFINITELY MATCHED THE HATCH ON A RECENT SESSION OFF THE BAY.

THE OUTLOOK THIS MONTH IS WET BUT DON'T LET THAT DAMPEN YOUR SPIRITS, AS THE FISHING IS GOING TO BE SENSATIONAL.

OFFSHORE

The incredible run of Yellowfin tuna is continuing to produce the goods offshore, with the fish holding wide of Newcastle and Norah Head. The latest Altimetry map suggests that we might have them around for a little while yet as well. The charts are also showing the warm water is pushing down the coast at the moment with reports of Marlin at Port Macquarie so it can't be long before we see them stack up locally.

Snapper are still holding tight around the reefs in decent numbers although as the water starts to warm up, we tend to see them move into deeper water. This time of year the bait starts to stack up around the edges of the inshore reef systems and with the Snapper feeding under the bait it really pays to either float a bait or plastic's, especially a grub style though it to find the fish. The Fads have been deployed along the coast but reports so far are they are pretty lifeless although things can change overnight with the current and warm water well on its way.

ESTUARIES

The options are endless for Lake Macquarie. We have crabs and prawns on the move and hot on their tails are Flathead, Bream and Whiting so now is the time to throw a line in along the shallows and structures around the lake. Jewies are still being found throughout the lake holding tight around the bait in the deeper areas.

Our other main systems such as inside the Bay and Newcastle Harbour are also in the same boat as the lake, with the Prawns pushing out of the Myall and the Hunter river also bringing the fish on the boil in these areas. The standout will be the fishing after the recent rain. As the fresh pushes out of the estuaries, things tend to really liven up a couple of weeks following a flush especially the Jew around Newcastle Harbour.

DAMS, CREEKS AND RIVERS

The fishing's back on in the dams as the fish are virtually attacking everything presented to them. This wet weather should also help push the fish in tight to the edges primed ready for a surface bite to begin.

The creeks and rivers will be a bit of a write off early November but will definitely be worth sussing out later in the month if the weather clears a little, although this could be a bit of a stretch looking at the long-range forecast.



Our drinks came out quickly which is always a good sign and although there was no option to add a slice of lemon or lime to my gin and tonic, it still went down a treat.

Our main course also came out promptly. For my main, I ordered the Chicken Caesar Wrap which came with grilled chicken breast, cos lettuce, parmesan cheese, bacon, egg and Caesar dressing. The wrap was well toasted and came with golden, crunchy fries.

My colleague ordered their Signature Glaze Chicken which was served with a Jack Daniels glaze drizzled on a char-grilled chicken breast, thick cut fries, slaw and an extra side of the glaze.

The glaze was delightful and tangy, and the meal was generous in size. So generous in fact, my colleague had to pop a few pant buttons open to make room for the last few bites.

We didn't sample any of the desserts following our huge mains, but I think next time I go I will definitely be trying the brownie obsession, which is a warm brownie that is served covered in hot chocolate fudge sauce, caramel sauce, creamy vanilla ice cream and chopped pecans.


